

only that semester and if he failed in both the semesters than both the Semesters).

2. A candidate, who has failed in the examinations but is eligible for back paper facility, shall not be allowed to appear in the examination as an ex-student.
3. A candidate shall be allowed to appear as ex-student for not more than **once a year** to the condition that he will have to clear the LL.M. Course in maximum **(4) Four Years**. If he fails to pass the examination during this period, he will be deemed to have abandoned the course and shall not be readmitted.

F. Readmission

1. There shall be no readmission in the first, and third semesters.
2. A student, who has failed in examination or failed to appear in the examinations and who is otherwise eligible to appear in the examination as an ex-student shall not be admitted as a regular student.

G. Improvement

A candidate who has passed all the semesters with aggregate of 48% marks; is eligible for improvement only in two individual papers, and will be allowed to appear those papers in the respective semester examinations of the next year.


